From Pastor Adam



Dear pre-COVID Self,

I couldn't have warned you, if I tried. Words just don't do justice to how quickly things changed in just a few months.

One minute you're finalizing summer vacation plans at your favorite dinner spot, and the next minute you're fighting the urge to buy excessive amounts of nonperishable goods, while calculating your family's toilet paper usage.

It seems like overnight you learned a whole new vocabulary with words like *social distancing*, *quarantine*, *ventilators*, and *droplet transmission*. You've become proficient at Zoom and can intelligently debate herd immunity, vaccination timelines, and the best ways to flatten the curve.

Our once thriving economy is now handing out furloughs, and almost overnight we've become a nation of home-schoolers (oh, homeschooling, you're really something). We've mourned for our high school seniors, worried about our senior adults, and lamented the increasing racial tension threatening to divide our great nation.

But, pre-COVID me, please know that somewhere along the way you're going to stop to ask a really vulnerable but important question: "God, where are you in the middle of this?"

The answer may be hard to find as the days grow longer and the news seems darker.

But dig deep.

It's there. God's there.

You'll find God in the still small places where he always has been and always will be, revealing his greatest glory.

Look for God in everything from the birthday parades to family movie nights. You'll find God in the return of families around the dinner table and the unrushed nightly bedtime routines. He's on your countless walks around the neighborhood and in the Zoom reunions with extended family.

You'll feel God's presence when you're playing board games with your kids, teaching them how to cook and clean, and especially when you see your previously overcommitted family finding rest and perspective in a new, simplified routine.

You'll hear amazing stories of God working through our frontline workers, caring selflessly for the sickest of patients and often at the expense of their own families. God will be evident in the melody of pots and pans banging from the balconies of high-rises, as people unite in the most difficult of times.

God's hand will be visible as communities rally together to support local businesses and as friends and neighbors dust off of old sewing machines to make face masks to protect each other. You'll feel God's presence when you look up to see the Blue Angels and Thunderbirds soar through the sky, or even as you look down and find messages of hope in colorful sidewalk chalk in your neighborhood.

I guess what I would want you to know is that there are going to be some really hard times to weather, but, in the middle of the uncertainty, there's an opportunity to reaffirm God's promise that He is with us, for us, and will never leave us.

King David said it this way:

Where can I go from your Spirit?
Where can I flee from your presence?
If I go up to the heavens, you are there;
if I make my bed in the depths, you are there.
If I rise on the wings of the dawn,
if I settle on the far side of the sea,
even there your hand will guide me,
your right hand will hold me fast.
If I say, "Surely the darkness will hide me
and the light become night around me,"
even the darkness will not be dark to you;
the night will shine like the day,
for darkness is as light to you.
— Psalm 139:7-12

Even the darkness is not dark to God, because He is light. There is nowhere we can go where He is not fully present, protecting us even as the things we hold certain seem to be crumbling around us.

Look for God's faithfulness in the big and small things.

And be brave in the "time-such-as-this" opportunities to speak hope to a struggling world.

Session Notes

At the February Zoom Session meeting, we had 100% attendance for the third month in a row. Your elders are faithful.

The Clerk's Annual Statistical Report for 2020 was approved and is included in the Annual Report packet. Among the positives are average attendance at worship 190 pre-COVID and many, many views of our on-line services, about 79% of membership attends worship. We had a net gain of membership of 3 people to a total of 239. Also 35% of adult members attend one or more of our Adult Christian Education groups.

Session approved splitting the Treasurer position responsibilities into a Gift and Giving Coordinator (one-third of the time required) and Treasurer (two-thirds of the time required). The new position will begin as soon as someone can be named and trained.

The Finance and Administration committee is planning for a review of the financial records of 2019 and 2020 on May 15, 2021. Since this review involves close contact of several people, it was postponed until it may be more safely accomplished. The committee also recommended fully funding our contribution to National Capital Presbytery's unified giving fund at \$6,600.00. This is our contribution to the work of the presbytery over and above the per capita amount. This funds many ministries of the presbytery and our congregation has received several grants from programs funded by the unified giving.

Session approved funding of up to \$22,000.00 for installation of a fiber optic line from Verizon which will provide a much-needed upgrade. They authorized Norman Cobb to sign Verizon and USA Cable contracts for this project and Gary Smith to write the needed checks.





Again & Again, A Lenten Refrain, a devotional, will be emailed to you until Easter (about three times each week). Please look for the devotional in your email mailbox.








Romans


Women's Monday Bible Study also known as Bible Buddies

Cub Scout Pack 289

2020 Annual Report to First United Presbyterian Church of Dale City

This report provides an overview of the Cub Scout Pack 289 activities for the congregation and leadership of the First United Presbyterian Church of Dale City. The interruption of COVID-19 presented enormous challenges at all levels, for the nation as a whole, down to the local community. In addition, from the Scouts BSA national organization's financial and legal struggles to the merger of the Occoquan and Bull Run districts into one Prince William district, this past year has been a time of change. Through it all, Pack 289 has persisted and continued our mission to provide a high quality, outdoor-based program for all eligible Cub Scouts that encompasses and achieves the aims of the Boy Scouts of America. We currently have 69 Scouts and 28 adult leaders with strong support from our parent volunteers.

We were fortunate to have completed much of our program year by the time the initial quarantine restrictions were issued in March. While we were not able to conduct our usual spring and summer Pack campouts and related in-person events like our rain gutter regatta competition or marching in the Dale City Independence Day parade, our den leaders and parents adapted to the virtual environment and continued meetings via Zoom or similar platforms, so that most Scouts did complete rank for the year. We conducted a virtual rain gutter regatta in June, and a virtual community clean-up in July, and wrapped up our program year with a drive-through bridging in August. Dens and individual families also participated in virtual campouts and other events conducted by the National Capital Area Council.

With the move to virtual Scouting and limited in-person group sizes, there was some attrition, but new adult leaders stepped up and current leaders raised a hand to take on new or vacant roles. Their support facilitated a great start to our 2020/21 program year, with a combination STEM Saturday/Join Scouting event in September, and an actual in-person fall campout at Prince William Forest Park in October, when group meeting restrictions were somewhat relaxed. By continuing to maintain our year-round program in a virtual or small group environment, we were able to attract and absorb Scouts from surrounding units that were being disbanded.

Popcorn continues to be our only fundraiser, and was conducted all online this year due to COVID-19 restrictions. While far below a normal year, many of our Scouts were able to help finance their Scouting activities, and will hopefully be able to pay their own way should day and resident camps be offered this coming summer.

As a Pack, we have shifted event plans and adapted to virtual environment, but it continues to be the dedication of our Scouts and volunteers that make the success of our Pack possible.

Boy Scout Troop 964

2020 Annual Report to First United Presbyterian Church of Dale City

Despite having to adapt to a global virus pandemic, BSA Troop 964 experienced a successful 2020. New Scouts were recruited, many Scouts advanced in rank, a variety of activities were held and new leadership rose to the occasion.

In March, enough Arrow of Light Scouts were recruited to the troop from local Cub Scout packs to form three new patrols of eight to ten scouts each. This offered some of the older boys an opportunity to lead them through the early ranks as Troop Guides. During 2020, contact was made with many upcoming Arrow of Light Scouts and the troop looks to grow by about ten more boys early in 2021.

The troop kicked off the year with an Eagle Court of Honor celebrating two Eagle Scouts. Four more were added to the ranks over the course of 2020, with projects that included a beach clean-up, memorial tree planting, improvements and maintenance at an outdoor pavilion and a food drive. The other Scouts in the troop earned 39 rank advancements during 2020, for all ranks from Scout through Life. Many merit badges were also earned, with increased opportunities to earn merit badges virtually.

Although challenged at first with new restrictions on gathering sizes and distancing, the Scouts of Troop 964 quickly adapted to holding their weekly meetings virtually using Zoom. Summer camp was attended virtually in 2020. Patrols began to hold campouts and in-person activities in late summer and the annual Pumpkin Chuckin' was held in November with strict adherence to the governor's mandates. Although the effort to adapt was valiant, all the Scouts agree that they look forward to the day when the troop will again be able to function similarly to how it ran pre-COVID.

Historically, Troop 964's main fundraiser and signature activity has been the annual Train Show. It was not able to be held in 2019 or 2020, but tentative plans are being made to hold the merit badge class in conjunction with the Manassas Heritage Railway Festival in June. The troop is also looking at holding a Christmas tree sale during December 2021 to replace our train show as a fundraiser.

2020 saw the passing of the Scoutmaster baton from Mr. Rob Stonaker to Mr. Steve Upthegrove. The transition was smooth and well-supported by both gentlemen as well as the strong contingent of Assistant Scoutmasters. The troop committee also continues to thrive with many adults invested in helping the troop run behind the scenes.

Troop 964 would like to thank First United Presbyterian Church of Dale City for their continued support as our charter organization for the 43rd year. We look forward to many more years of mutual support.
