

From Pastor Adam



For many years, I kept a note card on my office wall that proclaimed the message: "We are an Easter people." I received the note from a parishioner, a mother of 3 boys, who was living with advanced stage ovarian cancer at the time the card was written. In the week after Easter, Amy Sharp had scripted this pink magic-marker message on a variety of her personal note cards and sent them to family and friends.

I remember opening this Easter greeting and reading it several times. It did not say "Happy Easter," nor did it say, "Rejoice, the Lord is risen." It said, "We are an Easter people." As I read the card, I knew it bore a message of profound faith. As her death approached, Amy wanted all whom she loved to know that the power of faith transforms even death, for we are an Easter people.

The note card kept its post for many years. It became a reminder to pray for Amy's family, and a daily reminder that encouraged a faithful life. In the face of illness and death, to be sure, this proclamation of faith is a consolation. Yet in all times, this proclamation holds the potential to be an everyday guide: We are an Easter people.

What, then, does it look like to be an Easter people? How are we to live? If we start at the very beginning and search the Acts accounts of the Easter season Scriptures, we learn how that very first community of Jesus' followers began to shape their priorities and create a way of life.

From the record of those early days, a modus operandi begins to emerge. Within the early community, "there was no needy person among them" (Acts 4:34). Those who had more property and wealth liquidated their assets and gave the money to the apostles to distribute to those in need. This may be startling information to our 21st-century selves, but it is nonetheless true.

As the community developed attitudes, rules and a self-image; the Spirit was at work among them. At first, the Jesus followers shunned the newly converted Paul. They feared that he had not changed and would turn on them. But they came to believe, with the help of their own Barnabas, that radical change is the sure sign of the work of the Spirit of Jesus (Acts 9:27).

Those early folks also had presumptions about whom God favored and loved the best. In time, they understood that God truly shows no partiality among humankind (Acts 10:34). All are equal in the sight of God. Finally, there was a clear message on that Ascension day that Easter people do not dawdle looking up at the sky but must live as active witnesses to faith wherever they are (Acts 1:11).

In response to these guidelines, we might say that times are very different now. We might add that the smaller size of the nascent community made sharing one's wealth a manageable practice, but not in our age. We might want to maintain our own exclusive practices, loving those who look and think as we do, judging those who do not. We might want to ignore the faith's invitation to radical change that invites reexamination of our own priorities, our words and actions, and even our use of time. We might want to say those things and more, but the truth of Scripture is ever ours, speaking anew to us each day, calling us to truly be an Easter people.

To be honest, there are Easter people in all of our church communities whose faithfulness inspires our own. They are the ones who trust the Spirit's presence, even in the midst of adversity. They are the ones who refuse to keep up with the envied "Joneses" and raise their children to do the same. They are the ones who accept their own illnesses as opportunities to reveal God's love to others. They are the ones who quietly feed the hungry and share their own resources with faithful abandon and shape the next generation so they will do the same. They are the ones whose hearts ache with grief as they approach the Lord's table, hands outstretched and the, "Thanks be to God" on their lips.

And they are the ones who gather their families in the face of approaching death and remind them that they are an Easter people. We are the Easter people who believe that the cross transformed all suffering and pain, and the Resurrection secured the promise of eternal life. It is this paschal mystery, this Easter faith, that we are called to live each day.

Session Notes

At the March 16 meeting, the Session approved outdoor lawn and parking lot worship services for April 23, May 9, May 23 (Pentecost) and June 6 (Installation and Ordination of church officers). As before, these are weather dependent. The building will remain closed to indoor meetings and activities until at least June 12, 2021 and a Church Opening task force led by Jon Guest will be planning the reopening.

Congratulations to Nancy Hummer and the Earth Care team! Our congregation has qualified as a certified Earth Care congregation of the Presbyterian Church (USA). Our replacement of fluorescent and incandescent bulbs with LED bulbs was a major project completed in the name of being good stewards of our resources--electrical consumption has been lowered. We are all challenged to participate by being earth friendly in our activities in the church building, on the grounds, and at home.

Session heard an interim report from Pam Cox and Pat Manalio, leaders of the Transitions Team, and approved seven ministry team leaders. More information about the new ministry team leaders will be found elsewhere in the newsletter.

Kathy Cobb was approved as the new Gifts and Giving Coordinator, and will be working with the treasurer, taking responsibility for this area. This position was established to relieve the treasurer of some of the workload.

Up to two spirit night type fundraisers per month were approved, with Little Hands Preschool being approved for monthly spirit nights, beginning in March, up to 15 total events. These events allow everyone to support the preschool through choosing to eat at the participating restaurants.




Women's Monday Bible Study also known as Bible Buddies


Horizons Monthly Bible Study


Join us on Saturday, April 17 at 7:00 PM: Prince William Food Rescue (PWFR).

Transition Team

Report from the Transition Team

We want to update you on some exciting news.

In December of 2019, Session created a Commission on Reorganization to study when we elect church officers and how we organize ourselves. The Commission worked diligently throughout much of 2020 and made two recommendations to Session.

The first recommendation was to elect church officers in February, to train and examine them in the spring, and to ordain and install them before the start of the summer break for schools. This moves the training of officers away from the busy Advent/Christmas season. Session approved the recommendation and it was implemented this year.

The second recommendation was to adopt a leadership and management structure where the day-to-day management of our ministries and programs is separated from the discernment of God's calling for FUPCDC and long-term planning to answer that call. This structure has been used successfully by many other Presbyterian churches for several years. Session approved this recommendation, held a forum for the congregation via Zoom on January 10, 2021, and established a Transition Team to implement the new structure beginning June 1, 2021.

So, you might be asking "what does the new structure look like?"

Session will have nine (9) Ordained Elders serving three-year terms, plus one optional Youth Elder serving a one-year term. Session will be God-centered; it will focus on God's calling to FUP-CDC, establish short—term and long-term goals (strategic vision and focus) to achieve that calling, and monitor the spiritual health and vision of the congregation as a whole. In addition, each Elder will serve as a liaison to one of the ministry teams to provide support and a connection to Session.

The day-to-day management and implementation of our ministries and programs will be carried out by nine (9) ministry teams, each headed by a team leader. The ministry teams and a brief description of their areas of responsibility are:

Worship: Provide high quality, engaging, and creative worship experiences for all ages

Mission: Serve others in the spirit of Christ in the local, regional, national, and international communities

Growing in Faith: Encourage and nurture all ages to grow in their faith and apply it in their daily lives

Fellowship: Create, sustain, and cultivate opportunities for the congregation to grow together in fellowship

Congregational Care: Care for members and friends of the church

Evangelism & Outreach: Spread the good news about Jesus Christ and the work of the church with those outside our walls

Administration: Oversee and coordinate the business management of the church including personnel, information technology, records management, risk management, safety & security, office operations

Property: Manage the building, grounds, furnishings, and equipment of the church **Stewardship:** Encourage faithful stewardship while managing the church finances

We are proceeding with a plan for Drama Camp. We would like to invite all church members to participate.


Our plan is a hybrid model for ages 5 to 16.
