Why I Don't Preach about Mothers on Mother's Day

FUPCDC faith family,

I've been your Pastor for almost two and a half years, and so I think it's now time to tell you why I don't preach about mothers or mothering on Mother's Day. I know some of you may be disappointed to hear this news. Know that we *will* recognize Mother's Day during a special Prayers of the People this year. But, besides the fact that this is a secular holiday and not a religious one, I want you to be aware that it is also a difficult day for many.

I became especially aware of this fact when Amy Young posted her now infamous (in the clergy world) "Open letter to Pastors" in 2012 on her blog "The Messy Middle." I thought that I would reprint that letter here, so we can all grow in faith and understanding about ways that we can love the women in our lives this year and in the years to come.

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An open letter to pastors (A non-mom speaks about Mother's Day)

Dear Pastor,

Tone can be tricky in writing. Picture me popping my head in your office door, smiling and asking if we could talk for five minutes. I'm sipping on my diet coke as I sit down.

You know that I'm not one to shy away from speaking my mind, part of the reason you love me (mostly!), so I'm guessing that internally you brace yourself wondering what might be next.

I set my can down and this is what I'd say.

A few years ago I sat across from a woman who told me she doesn't go to church on Mother's Day because it is too hurtful. I'm not a mother, but I had never seen the day as hurtful. She had been married, had numerous miscarriages, divorced and was beyond child bearing years. It was like salt in mostly healed wounds to go to church on that day. This made me sad, but I understood.

Fast forward several years to Mother's Day. A pastor asked all mothers to stand. On my immediate right, my mother stood and on my immediate left, a dear friend stood. I, a woman in her late 30s, sat. I don't know how others saw me, but I felt dehumanized, gutted as a woman. **Real women stood, empty shells sat.** I do not normally feel this way. I do not like feeling this way. I want no woman to ever feel this way in church again.

Last year a friend from the States happened to visit on Mother's Day and again the pastor (a different one) asked all mothers to stand. As a mother, she stood and I whispered to her, "I can't take it, I'm standing." She knows I'm not a mother yet she understood my standing / lie.

Here's the thing, I believe we can honor mothers without alienating others. I want women to feel welcome, appreciated, seen, and needed here in our little neck of the body of Christ.

1. **Do away with the standing. You mean well, but it's just awkward.** Does the woman who had a miscarriage stand? Does the mom whose children ran away stand? Does the single woman who is pregnant stand? A.w.k.w.a.r.d.

2. Acknowledge the wide continuum of mothering.

To those who gave birth this year to their first child—we celebrate with you

To those who lost a child this year – we mourn with you

To those who are in the trenches with little ones every day and wear the badge of food stains – we appreciate you

To those who experienced loss through miscarriage, failed adoptions, or running away—we mourn with you

To those who walk the hard path of infertility, fraught with pokes, prods, tears, and disappointment – we walk with you. Forgive us when we say foolish things. We don't mean to make this harder than it is.

To those who are foster moms, mentor moms, and spiritual moms – we need you

To those who have warm and close relationships with your children – we celebrate with you

To those who have disappointment, heart ache, and distance with your children – we sit with you

To those who lost their mothers this year – we grieve with you

To those who experienced abuse at the hands of your own mother – we acknowledge your experience

To those who lived through driving tests, medical tests, and the overall testing of motherhood – we are better for having you in our midst

To those who are single and long to be married and mothering your own children – we mourn that life has not turned out the way you longed for it to be

To those who step-parent – we walk with you on these complex paths

To those who envisioned lavishing love on grandchildren -yet that dream is not to be, we grieve with you

To those who will have emptier nests in the upcoming year – we grieve and rejoice with you

To those who placed children up for adoption — we commend you for your selflessness and remember how you hold that child in your heart

And to those who are pregnant with new life, both expected and surprising —we anticipate with you

This Mother's Day, we walk with you. Mothering is not for the faint of heart and we have real warriors in our midst. We remember you.

3. Commend mothering for the ways it reflects the Imago Dei (Image of God) by bringing forth new life, nurturing those on her path, and living with the tension of providing both freedom and a safety net.

I know I might be an unusual one to be speaking about Mother's Day; but maybe that's why so many talk to me about mothering, I've got the parts, just not the goods. Thanks for listening and for continuing to mother us in a shepherding way. Even though I'm a bit nervous to come on Sunday, I will be here. But if you make us stand, I might just walk out =).

Session Notes

April Report from Session

The Session approved returning to worship inside the building on Sunday, July 4, 2021 upon recommendation of the Safety and Security committee. It will also be the return to two worship services as before closing to inside gatherings; a traditional service at 8:30 AM and a contemporary service at 11:00 AM.

The building will be open to inside groups beginning on Sunday, August 1. 2021. The Safety and Security committee will continue to monitor the world and local situation and make recommendations and modifications as needed. More details will be announced as we approach these dates.


The results of the congregational meeting vote to elect Agnes Fokwa and Nne Kalu to serve as deacons in the class of 2024 and Anne Green,a deacon to fill an unexpired term in the class of 2022 were approved. The votes were 95 yes, 0 votes no, 0 abstentions. These ladies and deacons elected at the annual meeting in February will be ordained (if they have not previously been ordained) and installed during worship on June 6. This is our new schedule to match installation of church officers with the church program year.

Charlotte Stultz and Curt Hoagland were approved to be the Ministry Team Leaders for Evangelism and Outreach and Growing in Faith, respectively, beginning June 6, 2021. Previously approved Ministry Team Leaders are Martin Andrews (Worship), Pam Cox (Mission), Dennis Dingle (Stewardship), Betsy Gilbert (Fellowship), Mike Gundel (Property), Ellen Nuernberger (Congregational Care/Deacons), and Jim Stacy (Administration). These leaders will serve a two-year term.

A virtual book fair was approved for the Mission and Outreach committee to hold to support ENIC International Elementary School in Cameroon. There will be more details later in bulletins and newsletters. You will be able to purchase books for the school and for your own use through this event.

Conduit has been laid from Dane Ridge to the church in preparation for bringing Verizon fiber optics into the church building. The same trenching will also serve to bring power to a new electronic church sign. A contract has been signed with RTE Media on behalf of the church to upgrade live streaming, lighting, and projection capabilities. Both the Audio-Visual task force and the Church Sign task force are working hard to bring these project to completion and make upgrades to church communications.


Women's Monday Bible Study also known as Bible Buddies

Have you ever said or thought 'I'm not a racist?' Do we really understand racism? Or how to go about dismantling it? The Reverend John Molina-Moore, General Presbyter on National Capitol Presbytery and Rev. Tara Spuhler McCabe will lead our discussion.

The Dismantling Racism Project is one strategy intended to increase the breadth and depth of racial justice work in the region through supporting organizations to build a shared analysis of race and racism, to engage in anti-racist organizational development and to move racial justice organizing campaigns.

Racism is defined as a set of societal, cultural, and institutional beliefs and practices, 'regardless of intention' that subordinate and oppress one race for the benefit of another. Topics we will explore include;



- 4) you can donate money and we will pick books for classes...


(Books that are both culturally and age appropriate.)
