From Pastor Adam



Every Member In Ministry

FUPCDC Family of Faith,

By the time you read this article, we will be days away from switching to our new leadership model here at First United Presbyterian Church of Dale City, VA. This new model starts June 6, 2021 with the ordination and installation of church officers. Our session will go from 15 Elders to 9 Elders. In addition, we have already commissioned new Ministry Team Leaders to lead 9 new Ministry Teams.

After much prayer and study, the session of FUPCDC decided on this hybrid model of church leadership. It is important to know that this model has been very successful at many other Presbyterian churches. This new structure will give our Session more time to be God focused. The Elders will spend more time in prayer, study, and discernment—for God's calling and direction for FUPCDC—and for our future service in Christ's Kingdom. As we like to say (and sometimes sing), "Prayer is the key!"



As we transition away from social distancing, virtual only worship, zoom calls, and masks, thanks to God's gift of highly effective vaccines; we want to be prepared and ready to "hit the ground running" for God's plans and purposes for our lives, and for the life of our community of faith.

So, what does this have to do with you? In one word...everything! It doesn't matter if you aren't currently serving as an Elder, Deacon, or Ministry Team leader. We are *all* part of the church—the body of Christ. This reminds me of a famous passage from Paul's letter to the church in Corinth:

"For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³ For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

¹⁴ Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. ¹⁵ If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. ¹⁶ And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. ¹⁷ If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? ¹⁸ But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. ¹⁹ If all were a single member, where would the body be? ²⁰ As it is, there are many members, yet one body. ²¹ The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." ²² On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, ²³ and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; ²⁴ whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, ²⁵ that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. ²⁶ If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it. ²⁷ Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it."



-1 Corinthians 12:12-27

Yes, we need every member in ministry! Our goal is to have each member of FUPCDC plugged into one of our new ministry teams in some way. This doesn't mean you have to go to a meeting, or meetings. There are ways to be involved with a ministry team without attending their team meetings. However, that is always welcomed and appreciated as well!

Session Notes

May Report from Session

In a very busy meeting, the Session welcomed Elizabeth Vohar and Joseph Vohar as new Friends of the Church and authorized the baptism of their daughter, Eloise, at the outdoor worship service on May 23. Session also approved the transfer of Juanita Toatley to Hermon Presbyterian Church in Rock Hill, SC (the church where her father had been pastor).

Elders-elect and Deacons-elect Bill Ediage, Morelle Fokwa, Sam Parris, Debbie Cornelius, Agnes Fokwa, Debbie Folly, Helen Francois, Ann Green, Nne Kalu and Kathy McNeely were examined and approved to be installed on June 6 during worship and ordained, if not previously ordained. Session also approved distribution of the church directory information to the incoming Deacon Board.

Session also approved an electronic vote to allow One Hanson Pharmacy of Woodbridge to hold COVID vaccination clinics on May 15 and June 12, 2021.


The report of the examination of the church's financial records was received. The treasurer and finance committee were commended for handling the church's finances and financial records well. A budget mapping showing the transition of expenses into the new ministry structure was also received.

Starting July 11, 2021, authorized ministries affiliated with the church may use the inside facilities as approved by the Safety and Security committee and the Session. The Chancel Choir and Praises Team were approved to have practices from May 19, 2021 onward for those fully vaccinated following all state and federal guidelines.

Session approved creation of a statement spelling out church values and asking employees and volunteers to comply with vaccination guidelines when working with children.

The Church Operating Procedures, Personnel, Sexual Harassment and other policies were approved as amended to comply with changes made for transition to the new organizational plan.



and the state/federal guidelines. There will be Acting, Singing, Dancing, Crafts,







Girl... really?

I have been contemplating for several weeks how to address this topic because I feel I will get resistance. The past several weeks there have been multiple instances where who I am and my pastoral authority has been challenged. That's nothing new for me in general as a woman and an ordained woman. But here recently it's been worse and in the last week it's been mostly men who think they are entitled to something.

One of my biggest pet peeves is being addressed as "girl". I hear, "You're a pretty little girl to be a chaplain" or "they let a little girl like you be a chaplain" or "we don't want a girl chaplain" or "a girl chaplain... interesting" or "hey girl can you do X". And a variety of several other phrases. I recognize there are many other layers to these phrases including women in ministry and the role of chaplain. But what I am addressing now is the "girl". I can't stand even when other women call me "girl". And I definitely can't stand being called girl in professional settings.

So let's unpack this a little. According to Webster "Girl" is referring to a female child. So in case you aren't aware I am not a child. It is inaccurate to call me a girl. I haven't been a girl in about 16 years. I have birthed a child. I am able to drink, rent a car, have a mortgage etc. I am not a girl. I have responsibilities. I am able to care for myself.

Secondly, there is a power struggle here. But by referring to me as a girl you are making it evident you do not view me as a colleague or equal. You view me as "too young" or "Too immature" or "not experienced" but the message I hear is "I don't view you as equal to me:" If you would not refer to a male colleague as a "boy" don't do it to women.

Also the "hey girl" makes me think you have no idea what my name is. I was at a restaurant recently and this douche behind me at a table hollered for our waitress by saying "HEY GIRL. YOU GIRL. COME BACK GIRL". I first had to compose myself. I later said, "excuse me ma'am. I am sorry first because I don't remember you name. Secondly, I am sorry you were treated that way by the table behind us. You deserve more respect than that but I also recognize your tips depend on you taking that abuse." I thought she was going to cry. She told me how demeaning it was to constantly be treated so disrespectfully.

Look here's the thing. Language matters. How we refer to other human beings matter. As Mayim Bailik stated in her video, "When we use words to describe adult women that are typically used to describe children, it changes the way we view women." And yes words are just words. But if I always referred to you as "Trashy" would that not piss you off, affect how you are treated at work, or even become the narrative at work? I am aware some people reading this will think "Oh I get that" but others won't and will resist the conversation about this. But let me tell you what's happened.

- 1- We don't want a girl chaplain to visit.— dying patient's family. What message do you hear?
- 2- Why do I have to go through you? Girl- Two PASTORS recently (we won't get into those yet)
- 3- Why is the chaplain answering this call? Why is the chaplain a girl?— recent family Continued on Page 23

- 4- We don't believe in female preachers so a girl like you wouldn't be able to preach— coworker
- 5-Let me tell you how to come into the room (then proceeded to man-splain my job)— male pastor
- 6- Oh this is the little girl I was telling you about. —- Patient
- 7- ohhh you're too pretty a girl to be a chaplain—patient (so only ugly women are chaplains?)

I won't continue because this is in the fast few weeks. Language matters. I am sure we can all agree that it's disrespectful to say "Aww look a that cute little boy up there preaching" talking about my fellow male colleagues who are pastors.

I encourage you to ponder for yourself the language you use when talking to people. How you interact with people. I think the thing I try to remember is I don't get to control what people prefer to be called. I hope I am open enough to explore their perspective and challenge myself instead of being defensive and trying to explain why their feelings are wrong.

Moral of the story. I am an adult woman. I don't want to be called girl. I am proud of how my body is aging and how it continues to work. I want to set an example for my son what a strong woman is and how it is not threatening.


