From Pastor Adam



FUPCDC Family of Faith,

I heard this funny story of a lonely guy who decided that life would be more fun if he had a pet. So he went to the pet store and told the owner that he wanted to buy an unusual pet. After some discussion, he decided on a centipede, which came in a little white box to use as its house.

He took the centipede home, found a good location for the box, and then decided he would start off by taking his new pet to a restaurant to have dinner. So, he asked the centipede in the box, "Would you like to go out with me to have dinner?" But there was no answer from his new pet. This bothered him a bit, but he waited a few minutes and then asked him again, "How about going out for a meal with me?"

But again, there was no answer from his new friend and pet. So, he waited a few minutes more, thinking about the situation. He decided to ask him one more time; this time putting his face against the centipede's house and shouting, "Hey, in there! Would you like to go with me to have dinner?" A little voice came out of the box from the centipede: "Patience man! I heard you the first time! I'm putting on my shoes!"

Patience is something that many of us have trouble with: from driving down I-95 and coming to a long line of traffic and knowing we're going to be late, to arriving at a long line at the grocery check-out. We become annoyed and irritated at delays like this. We get worked up—we become very impatient.

One person defined patience as "the ability to let your light shine after your fuse has blown." It's like looking for a highway exit when you're headed in the wrong direction; that second hour of Monopoly; and waiting for the light to turn green when you've spotted an empty parking space across the intersection.

Yes, patience is a virtue that comes hard for many of us. It's a quality we admire in others—perhaps the driver behind us, but we can't stand it in the driver in front of us. Patience is difficult because our pride, selfishness, and anger stand between us and patience. Many of us would have to admit that we find it difficult to be patient.

The Bible says it is important to be patient. Why is patience talked about in the Bible? Because God is patient with us, we need to be patient with our fellow human beings. That's not always easy, is it? Many of the people we must deal with—and sometimes even live with—can be obstinate, frustrating, selfish, inconsiderate, and absolutely impossible to please. They say and do the wrong things at the wrong time. Sometimes, they absolutely unnerve us.

The toddlers, tween, teen, and even adults in my house (myself included) are impatient sometimes. Our family has a song we sing when someone is being impatient. It goes like this:

Be patient, be patient.
Don't be in such a hurry.
When you get impatient,
You only start to worry.
Remember, remember
That God is patient, too.
And think of all the times
That God has had to wait on you!

As we begin to drop COVID-19 restrictions, we are all ready to get back to "the way things used to be." Many of us are vaccinated, and are ready to run full steam ahead. We have been ready for months to get back to hugs, eating out, and "normal" worship. While it is hard, we must remember to be patient.

You see, friends, scripture calls us to look out for the least, the lost, the vulnerable, and those on the margins of society. We must be patient and remember that children eleven years and under are unable to get vaccinated against COVID, and others are immunocompromised and the vaccine doesn't protect them. Many places are understaffed, folks are burned out, and non-profits and churches lack the volunteers they need to operate at 100%. We here at FUPCDC plan to crawl, walk, and then run towards a new normal. But, we must crawl and walk before we can run.

What patience teaches us most of all is that God is still at work. God hasn't finished yet. Christ is working in our world and he's working in our lives, testing us sometimes, making us think through issues. Sometimes that's tough to see. Sometimes it's tough to believe. We've waited and waited and hoped and prayed, and things still aren't the way we remember, or the way we want them to be.

The story is told about the great 19th century New England preacher, Phillips Brooks, who was unusually frustrated and agitated one day. This is the man who wrote "O Little Town or Bethlehem" and he was normally a very controlled, calm person—the sort of man who could write, "... how still we see thee lie." But this day, he was irritated, and when a close friend asked about it, Brooks said, "Well, I'll tell you. I'm in a hurry; but God isn't." Peter tells us in the New Testament that a 1,000 years are like a day for God. But sometimes, we want God to act, and to act right now.

Patience teaches us to wait, to remember that God is still in charge. Patience reminds us that God isn't finished yet. We may not understand all there is to know. Patience is a hard thing to create. It is virtually impossible to make yourself be patient. We can't produce patience on our own.

But as we mature in our Christian faith, as we learn to trust more and more that God really is in charge of this world and our lives, then patience is the fruit that grows as a natural result of our relationship with God. Remember, patience is a fruit of the Spirit. **Galatians 5:22** says, "**God's Spirit makes us... patient**". It's a fruit that God will grow. And God grows that fruit, as we grow in Christ. As we learn to trust him, as we learn to rely upon him, our patience grows.

I think the most important step we can take to develop patience is to *give God* control of our lives. "I waited patiently for the Lord; he turned to me and heard my cry," says Psalm 40:1. Think of it this way: every time you and I lose our patience, we're saying in effect, "I'm in control and God's not!" not-We're taking God out of the driver's seat and putting ourselves in it.

So, friends, let us all trust in God as we crawl, walk, and run towards our new normal. Let us remember that God is good and God is in control. And if you are feeling impatient, try singing the patience song.

Session Notes

June Report from Session

At the June 15 meeting of the newly formed Session, Elders were led by Attorney Lori MacKenzie in a discussion about what is policy (why we do something) versus procedure (how we do something). In the future, the Session will be mostly involved in policy decisions while the Ministry Team Leaders (MTLs) will be working with procedures as they carry out the ministries of the church.

Next, she also facilitated a discussion about conflict of interest in doing our work, using a scenario of a possible situation and looking at the various steps along the way as to what would be a conflict of interest or not be, and what a person should do if it appears that there is a conflict of interest. All Session members, MTLs and staff, including the Little Hands Preschool Director and staff have been made aware of our conflict of interest policy and annually sign a form indicating that they know about the policy and will abide by it.

Session learned that Little Hands Preschool (LHP) is hosting an Open House on July 17 from 9:00 AM to 11:00 AM, under the tent on the lawn near the parking lot, including families who have registered for the coming school year or who have shown an interest in the preschool. The event is open to the public and will be advertised in the community. Pastor Adam will be presenting a magic show among other activities and tours of the classrooms will be available during this time. The preschool is also hosting a spirit night at Sweet Frog on June 24.

At the last LHP Advisory Board meeting, Sue Lickiss was presented with a glass plaque honoring her twenty (20) years of service to the preschool. She was treasurer for many years and a member of the Board. She is moving from the community and will be missed.

The Electronic Sign Task Force presented an update on their progress. Session approved additional funding for the sign in order to secure what is needed for equipment and installation.

A joint motion from the Stewardship and Finance team and the Growing in Faith team to purchase video conference equipment to allow hybrid meetings from the church was approved. This will allow a group meeting at the church to include others electronically as part of the meeting.

A joint motion from the Stewardship and Finance team and the Safety and Security committee to purchase two UV air purification systems (one for the preschool area and one for the sanctuary) was approved. This will increase the quality of the air in both locations.

Elder Liaison responsibilities were assigned; the first person is the primary liaison to the Ministry Team and the second person is the alternate/backup).




Bible Drama Camp: The Phantom Tollbooth Jr.




