Session Report - July



At the July 18th meeting, the Session approved eight fundraising and donation requests for the 2019 - 2020 program year.

The Youth Fund, a fund restricted to funding youth activities, was renamed the Youth Mission Fund to reflect the focus on youth mission activities as opposed to general youth activities such as bowling, Bible studies, trips and so forth. The funding for the 2019 trip to Raleigh, NC scheduled for August 4th - 9th was approved.

After input from several ministries and committees, the Session voted to approve changes to the 2019 budget recommended by the Finance and Administration committee's mid-year review.

Additional funds for parking lot and drainage repairs were approved.

The formation of a sound system sub-committee related to the IT and Worship committees which will oversee the "tuning" of the sound system by a professional sound engineer familiar with church needs and will provide training for sound board operators was approved.



Reverend Stokes is a Licensed Professional Counselor in Virginia and Washington D.C. with the Center for Pastoral Counseling and she has an office here in Woodbridge.

Counseling and Ministry are second careers for Reverend Stokes. She is a retired State Department High Level Manager and has an excellent understanding of workforce issues. Juanita takes a holistic approach to counseling, addressing mental and spiritual health issues and honoring the individuality and uniqueness of each client.

Her clientele varies in age from adolescent through adult. Reverend Stokes counsels couples and families with clinical issues including Anxiety and Depression, Adjustment, PTSD, Grief and Loss, Behavioral, Spiritual, Substance Abuse, Communication, Anger and other life issues.

Grief and loss is multi-faceted and not just feelings we experience when a loved one passes away. During our lives we can encounter grief and loss in a variety of situations. Reverend Stokes personally journeyed through grief and made her own discoveries along the way.

Why should Christians care about the environment? Why should we be concerned about pollution, resource depletion, climate change and the burgeoning number of threatened and endangered species?

Many Christians argue that these things are not the Church's concern. They cite Genesis 1:26, in which God created man in His own image and granted him dominion over all the earth. They claim that this means that everything on Earth is mankind's to use and exploit for his own purposes.

A closer look at Genesis and the Bible as a whole, however, reveals the fallacy of this argument. A few examples follow.

- 1. God created the Earth and everything in it, and He declared that it was "very good" (Gen 1:3-31). God values His creation, and so should we. Furthermore, God is the true lord over His creation, not us (Ps 24:1-2, among many other verses). Therefore, we are His stewards or overseers, responsible to Him for the care of His creation.
- 2. When God decided to unleash a flood upon the Earth to destroy everything on it because mankind was evil, corrupt and sinful, He instructed Noah to save two of every species of animal so each species would survive (Gen 6:11-21). God cares about all of his creatures, and so should we.
- 3. Nature bears witness to the glory of God (Ps 19:1-4; Job 12:7-9 and others) and actively praises Him (Psalm 96:11-13). How many of us have seen the hand of God in His creation? How many of us have been brought to tears by the beauty of a sunset, caught our breath at the sight of a soaring bird of prey, marveled at the delicate beauty of a flower or fallen to our knees at the realization that God, who created and cares about each of these things, also created and cares for us? Should not future generations be able to experience these things as well?
- 4. We have a mandate to care for the poor (Matt 25:34-36; Luke 3:11) and the poor are the ones who suffer most when human activity disrupts their environment. Famine, floods, storms and pollution disproportionately affect the poorest countries, and the poorest people in each country. By engaging in more sustainable practices and opposing unrestricted development and exploitation of natural resources we demonstrate our love not only for God's creation, but for His people as well.

If you believe Christians should be leaders in taking care of the environment, proclaiming our concern for God's creation and for His people, please join the FUPCDC Earthcare group on Facebook for suggestions about ways you can help care for the Earth. This can be another form of witness and can enable us to reach people who may not otherwise experience God's love or hear the gospel. The well-being of the Earth should be everyone's concern.
