Hello, I'm Alex.

## National Night Out Tuesday, August 1st 5:00 PM—8:30 PM



## **State of the Presbytery**

The State of the Presbytery overall is pretty good. Compared with other Presbyteries across the country we are one of the best. We could be better however.

#### Some information:

In the standard Statistical reports we have 22 churches out of 89 reporting that indicated net growth last year. Percentagewise that is 24% of our congregations which saw numerical growth in membership. This is compared to 40 which reflected growth last year (with closer to 100 churches reporting) and 42 which reported growth the year before.



We have been seeing an average total membership reduction of about 400 members a year over the past several years. This last year we have seen a reduction of 826 members from those churches reporting. This dip is roughly twice what it has been over the last few years.

In years past we have received statistical reports from almost every congregation. This year 19 congregations did not submit statistical reports at all. 43 congregations gave no information about their financial receipts. Measuring the State of the Presbytery is not possible unless we have every church's statistical report. Please make plans now to complete this report next January. Jan Moody has assumed the position of Assistant to the Stated Clerk and will be asking for you to complete the online report next January. She, Sara Coe and I are eager to help you get online and complete these reports every January. We especially need membership figures, attendance records, and financial reports.

Of those churches reporting we see that the Presbytery has 20.4% non-majority (i.e. non-Caucasian) membership.

We speak twelve different languages in worship on a Sunday. We may be the most linguistically diverse Presbytery in the General Assembly.

Over the last five years our work has been guided by certain emphases which were derived from our Mission Statement. In the future look for a report measuring our accomplishments in those areas over the past five years. Also, the extent of our mission activity can be seen in the numerous Mission Videos which can be found on the Presbytery webpage and in the Mission Highlights bulletin inserts and short videos. One of the roles of a Presbytery commissioner is the communication of the range of Presbytery mission to the Session and congregation. Our webpage gives you every tool you need to communicate that mission. Please promote the use of these resources in your congregations.

We approved a new Mission Statement at the Last Presbytery meeting with a new set of mission emphases to direct our common work over the next five years. The previous Mission Statement had four sentences. Our new one has one sentence. "Sent by the Triune God to be agents of salvation, reconciliation and justice, we empower and challenge our congregations to be Missional, Pastoral and Prophetic."

Our Committee on Ministry is exemplary across the denomination for the processes for managing installed minister searches, interim ministry, conflict management and increasing the capacity for leadership in congregations. Our documents are replicated extensively across the General Assembly.

phone call from a church in another Presbytery with a question about procedures. Annemarie asked why the person was calling her and not someone on that other Presbytery's staff. "Well it says right here in the form to call you at this number." Our forms are widely copied, but perhaps not as widely edited.

We see the need for attention to evangelism. In that regard we are developing supporting networks for church renewal, transformation and evangelism through our Church Development Committee programs. We have trained about 20 interpreters for the Church Analysis Tool which aids in transformation endeavors, pastoral searches, and the evaluation of congregational ministry capacity. We have good training that too few churches

- take advantage of. We have grants at the ready for churches who are ready to bump their ministries up with additional staff or programs for evangelism. We also are actively fostering New Worshipping Communities. Our newest is in partnership with Riverside Presbyterian Church in Luckets, just north of Leesburg.
- We also have funding to support ministry networks sponsored by at least seven churches. If you have a passion, we want to bring a gift to it. We have international mission grants available to bring a gift to a congregation's international mission initiative. We have over the past year engaged an additional staff person, Mike McNamara to help these networks come together.
- We also have a goal for each church to devote 5% of their giving (minus benevolence expenditures and capital expenditures) to Presbytery and General Assembly Mission. We send a letter each fall to congregations with a specific request for this support and hope you will give it your consideration for the support of Presbytery mission. As you will see from the Webpage reports of activity, we are committed to making a difference together for the benefit of our congregations and our leaders.

We have also developed systems for the support of our pastors:

An annual Parish Pastor/ Educator Beach Retreat for refreshment and community.

We augment several facilitated support groups for pastors.

We have developed a Care Team to support clergy self-care and appreciation and support.

d. We are developing a cohort of coaches to support pastors and leaders in churches embracing intentional transformation.

We do have certain threats which are important to remember as well.

- a. It is more difficult to recruit people to serve Presbytery committees. When asked to serve please give it serious consideration. The system only works with wise, hard workers bringing their gift to the Presbyterian way of getting the business done.
- b. We do have one church property for sale which is costing the Presbytery \$20,000 a month in interest expenses which will not be recouped at the sale. Since that decision was made many years ago we have developed robust criteria for the approval of loans. Also, we are still a little over extended in our ratio of assets to contingent liabilities. We presently carry \$17MM in contingent liabilities. While we still enjoy approving loans for prudent congregations with a realistic plan, we are careful and will now decline support for risky building endeavors.
- c. Our Sexual Misconduct Prevention training is required every three years. A remarkable number of pastors are now out of compliance. If you have not taken that training in the last four years sign up tomorrow. We are sending weekly emails to those out of compliance. See the registration opportunities on the Presbytery webpage under "events." The policy requires mandatory administrative leave when a pastor is out of compliance.
- We have entered complex agreements around the sale of congregational property for three churches now. Those creative ministries are only possible with careful legal work to reduce the risks to both those congregations and the Presbytery. We must continue to be diligent in this regard so that we can be creative.
- 14. In summary, this Presbytery has remarkable resources, remarkable disciples, remarkable opportunities. May God bless us into bold faithfulness as we expose the idolatries of our time as we act as agents of God's salvation, reconciliation and justice.

We are not dying. We are Reforming. Significant Aspects of the 2016 Statistical Report May 24, 2017

We are moving towards a new future as a denomination. Membership loss, which was experienced since the 1970s, is slowing down. Congregations are refocusing on their mission. Mid councils are experimenting with ways to provide meaningful leadership in challenging times. Congregations are celebrating both anniversaries and new beginnings. Young adults are asserting their desires to serve in both domestic and international mission. Despite cries proclaiming the death of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), we remain a viable interfaith and ecumenical partner in many local communities while proclaiming a prophetic witness throughout the world. Our eulogy as a denomination has been written too soon, because God's Kingdom has not yet come. We are engaged both in the United States and around the globe. We are well-respected for our priestly and prophetic voice within Christendom. Our challenge is to see the powerful opportunities that are before us while declaring with Holy Spirit boldness that God is doing amazing work within us right now.

We have much more than we recognize.

It is my hope that initially we will make bold moves to embrace the communal nature of our theology and practice. I want to encourage mid councils to implement strategies to move congregations categorized as "Fellowships" to the status of chartered congregations, particularly when they have met membership requirements to charter. Many racial ethnic immigrant congregations are classified as

"Fellowships." These congregations are participating in the PC (USA), but are not fully brokered into the membership of the denomination. They are not required, in most instances, to pay per capita, while remaining non-voting members of presbyteries. This "half-in/half-out" status creates a perceived, racially motivated compromise that limits full participation even when many of these congregations outnumber by large margins long-term member congregations. My international travel offers clarity related to the new evangelism field of immigrants that know well the mission of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). We should embrace these immigrants with a sense of kinship while recognizing their long-term familiarity and association with our missionary work. Immigrants are not strangers. Therefore, we must not categorize immigrants as such through existing membership double standards. They are Presbyterians and should be accepted and embraced as we do all Presbyterians. This effort alone could demonstrate our intentionality towards fulfilling our failed commitment to increase racial ethnic participation 20 percent by 2010.[1]

God through Jesus Christ awaits our commitment.

As we are challenged to become a more racially diverse denomination in order to grow into the future, it is imperative that we invite new immigrants into our congregations as members; connect with those who benefitted from our ministry partnerships across the globe; hear the voices of our youth and young adults regarding their vision for the future of the church; train a new generation of leaders; and creatively engage in inviting people to a transformative experience in our worship and mission. Take the risk of asking those persons in your midst (both members and nonmembers) the question Jesus asked Bartimaeus "What do you want me to do for you?" (Mk. 10: 51). This question has power when offered in love.

I pray that a move of the Spirit will come over us in this new period of reform. Claiming persons to both experience the joy of fellowship and the faith within the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).
